## "Community Is Integral to the Christian Life"

On a cold, snowy January morning, my parents loaded us all up in the family car and we began carefully driving for several hours across my home-state of North Carolina. Once, as we were cresting the top of a steep downgrade, my father lost control of the car in the icy conditions. As we went zooming down the hill, we started sliding into the path of an oncoming tractor trailer truck. As we sped closer and closer towards impact with the truck, we all screamed. Then, just in the nick of time, our car slid out of the path of the truck and we were saved.

The occasion for this harrowing trip across state on a dreadful winter day was to attend my grandmother's funeral. We returned late that evening—physically, mentally, and emotionally exhausted. When we unlocked the door and walked into our kitchen, we were stunned to see dozens and dozens of grocery bags filled with food. I remember my father smiling for the first time that day and saying, "Well, it looks like we have been 'pounded." "Pounding" was a North Carolina tradition of giving provisions to a family going through a difficult time in their lives. "Poundings" were always done by churches; that is, faith communities.

One of the many blessings which we received from the Incarnation—when God became enfleshed in the person, Jesus—was that God taught us how we are intended to live. That is, Jesus provided the model of the lifestyle God intends for us to follow. Central to that Christian life is community. Throughout his ministry, Jesus lived and taught within a community. We know the names of the twelve disciples, who formed part of Jesus' community. But, Jesus' community was much larger than that. Jesus travelled with an entourage of people, such as Mary Magdalene and others.

Today, Christian congregations form those communities which God intends for us to live within. So, all of us live within the community of Christ UMC. Faith communities, such as ours, should strive to be inclusive. They are there to comfort us in times of sadness, encourage us in times of hardship, celebrate with us in times of joy, empower us as we seek to serve God, and teach us as we strive to grow closer to God.

While we gain tremendously from belonging to a faith community, we are also responsible for investing in our faith community. That is, we need to contribute to our faith community and its viability. This month, there are two unique ways that each of us can invest in our Christ UMC community:

- 1. Be sure to attend our <u>Seventieth Anniversary Celebration</u> on Sunday, October 9th. Sometimes it is important to look back before moving forward. Join us for a special service which looks back at our legacy over 70 years, while also encouraging us to look to the future and opportunities to serve God.

## Getting to Know Our Church Staff: Dr. Colt Ballou, Music Director & Organist

In this issue of *The Messenger*, we begin a new series of articles, getting to know our Church Staff better. We begin this series with Dr. Colt Ballou, our Music Director and Organist. Colt has one of those church positions in which much of his work is done behind the scenes, such as practicing the organ, helping plan worship, and planning other events for church.

For instance, Colt was instrumental in planning and organizing Allyance, our event sharing God's love and offering encouragement to our city's LGBTQ+ youth and their allies. Colt is also an important leader among church musicians within Lincoln. He also founded and conducts the Star City Chorus. Let's get to know Colt a little bit better:

**Tell us about yourself?** I grew up in Exira, Iowa, the youngest of three boys. After high school I attended Simpson College in Indianola, Iowa for music education. After college I taught music at Meskwaki Settlement School (a private school for Native American students) and later Marion High School. In 2013 I moved to Lincoln to earn my master and doctoral degrees in conducting from UNL. I am currently married to my Spouse Taylor (they /them) and have two cats, Bruiser and Hilda that are our fur babies. Some of my hobbies include watching tornado videos, playing Stardew Valley, 80's slasher movies and playing boardgames with friends.

Who is your favorite musical artist and why? I have a very eclectic taste in music, so I don't have a specific musical artist that's my favorite. Right now of the modern artists that I really respect is Lizzo. Besides being talented at singing she is a phenomenal flute player and demonstrates that classical and pop music can work together and is for all.

What do you like to do on vacation or your day-off? On my days off I like to relax with my spouse, watch movies, play video games, and go on little adventures

What is your favorite meal? My favorite foods are Asian dishes. Chinese, sushi, ramen, pho.

What is your favorite Biblical verse? John 13:34. "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another."
